Keeping Our Young People in Huntington: The Need for Affordable Rental Housing and Downtown Revitalization

A Huntington Community Summit on Affordable Rental Housing

Welcome to our summit on how we can keep young people in Huntington through the creation of affordable rental housing and downtown revitalization. A recent study found that today more young people under the age of 35 are living with their parents than ever before in American history. Why? Because they are debt burdened and are not earning enough money to afford their own rental apartments.

Closer to home, a 2014 study found "a huge exodus of young people, especially from mostly white, higher-income Long Island neighborhoods [like much of Huntington]," due to the lack of affordable rental housing. There were 15% fewer 25-to-34-year olds in 2009 than there were in 2000. Even more disturbing, the senior population in Huntington is growing at a faster rate than any other age group, raising the question, "Who will be here to purchase our homes when we are ready to sell?"

Long Island is the MOST expensive place to live in the US. In 2016, the median sale price of a home in Huntington was \$575,000. To be affordable – i.e., for the cost to be 30% of income – a family would have to earn \$191,000 a year to afford this home. Two thirds of Huntington families earn under \$150,000 a year, making the median-priced home unaffordable to them. This is why Suffolk has one of New York State's highest foreclosure rates.

The alternative to home ownership for young people is rental housing. In order to afford the 2016 median rental of \$2,900 a Huntington family must earn \$104,400 a year (again using the standard that 30% of family income should be spent for housing costs.) Because Huntington rental apartments are scarce and therefore expensive, 54.1% of Huntington renters pay "unaffordable" rents that are more than 30% of their income.

A 2013 study concluded, "The shortage of affordable rental homes is already straining Long Island's economy, and will make it much harder to compete for jobs in the years ahead." This is why we gather today to reflect on why we need affordable rental housing and downtown revitalization to keep our young people in Huntington. Through this summit, we hope to:

- Continue the Town-wide conversation on the need for affordable rental housing;
- Mobilize Huntingtonians (young professionals, senior groups, faith groups, communityservice, civic and business organizations) to deepen their awareness of the need for rental housing;
- Strategize next steps to secure support for affordable rental housing.

Enjoy the program and please commit to working with us for more affordable rental housing in Huntington on behalf of our economic security, our shared future and our young people.
